Comfort Cases has one goal: Bring Dignity and Hope to youth in foster care.



About Comfort Cases: Comfort Cases is a 501(c)3 nonprofit organization whose mission is to inspire communities by bringing dignity and hope to youth in foster care. We believe that every child deserves to feel a sense of dignity. Currently, when entering the system children are provided with a trash bag that they must use to quickly gather their belongings. The symbolic nature of the trash bag, an object meant for garbage and waste, can be representative of the situational instability experienced by a child in foster care. It can also represent a lack of self-worth, and paralyzing fear during a time of uncertainty.



The Comfort Cases Solution: Comfort Cases aims to eliminate the demoralizing practice of providing children with trash bags to store their belongings. Today, the organization has proudly assembled and delivered over 150,000 Comfort Cases and XLs for children and youth in foster care in all 50 states, Washington D.C., and Puerto Rico. New in 2021: We are expanding to serve the United Kingdom!



What are Comfort Cases? Comfort Cases are backpacks filled with comfort and personal care items for youth entering the foster care system. Children, youth, adults, groups from civic organizations, schools, corporations and religious organizations pack and prepare year-round. We provided nearly 13,000 cases in 2020 and are on course to distribute more than triple that number in 2021.



What is a Comfort XL? Comfort XL large collapsible duffel bags were introduced in 2018 to truly replace the need for trash bags for children entering foster care. Our goal is for every social worker and police officer in the country to have a supply of Comfort XL duffel bags to give to children when they are removed from their homes.

Foster Care Facts

On any given day, there are approximately 440,000 children in foster care in the United States, with over 220,000 children and youth entering the system each year.

700 children enter foster care every day; one child every 12 minutes.

96% of children in the foster care system have experienced a traumatic event or adverse childhood experience, and are more than twice as likely to be diagnosed with PTSD as combat veterans.

The average age of children in foster care is 7.6 years.

54% of all children in foster care are non-white or mixed race.

10% of youth in foster care have been in the system for 5 or more years.

60% of child sex trafficking victims have spent time in foster care.

On average, a child can spend almost 12 to 20 months in foster care. 10% of foster children spend more than 5 years in foster care. The average age of a child entering foster care is 7 to 8 years old. The average age of a child exiting foster care is 7 to 9 years old.

20,000 of youth in foster care age out of the system between the ages of 18-21 annually.

The foster care system underinvests in foster children, contributing less than 50% of what it costs an average American family to raise a child from 0-17 years of age.

Within four years of aging out, 50% have no earnings, and those who do make an average annual income of \$7,500.

Only 5% of rural foster youth and 21% of urban foster youth report access to a computer at home.




